Finding online resources

"Lord, to whom can we go?"

Avoid 'blind' searches; results often dated, theologically problematic

Especially true of generic searches. First hit for "Who is God?"



Who Is God - Who Does He Claim to Be?

Who is God? He's been described as everything from an impersonal life-force to a benevolent, personal, almighty Creator. He has been called by many names, including: "Zeus," "Jupiter," "Brahma," "Allah," "Ra," "Odin," "Ashur," "Izanagi," "Viracocha," "Ahura Mazda," and "the Great Spirit" to name just a few. He's seen by some as "Mother Nature" and by others as "Father God." But who is He really? Who does He claim to be?

Who Is God - Father God or Mother Nature?

Who is God? What has He revealed about Himself? To begin with, whenever He refers to Himself in parental terms, He always addresses Himself as "Father," never "Mother." He calls Himself "a Father to Israel," and in one instance, when His "children" were particularly disrespectful to Him, He said to them, "A son honors his father, and a servant his master. If then I am the Father, where is My honor? And if I am a Master, where is My reverence?" 2

Savvy searches will be specific, iterative, use 'mainline' language

- Bible study
- Bible study resources
- Bible study resources creation care
- Bible study resources environmental stewardship
- Bible study resources environment creation episcopal

- → narrows to specific topic
- → eliminates "creation care" brand
- → eliminates generic stewardship resources, zooms in to Episcopal resources

"Gradually, Then Suddenly"

This week I had the honor to co-facilitate with three of my colleagues a two and half day Fierce Conversations workshop for leaders in the Episcopal Church. The Fierce Conversations materials, which include two books and a series of other leadership resources, have had great success and popularity in the business community and are now being used in schools and churches. You can learn more about Fierce Conversations at www.fierceinc.com.

One of the most important principles taught in the Fierce
Conversations materials is based on a line from an Ernest
Hemmingway novel. In Hemmingway's The Sun Also Rises, a
character is asked how he went bankrupt. He answers, "Gradually,
then suddenly." Most problems, including bankruptcy, develop
gradually and then...suddenly. Fierce Conversations takes this idea
and expands it to matters other than one's financial stability,
stating, "Our work, our relationships, and, in fact, our very lives
succeed or fail, gradually then suddenly, one conversation at a
time."



There is much to unpack in this statement but here I would simply like to focus on the phrase, "gradually then suddenly." Most of the time when we experience a "suddenly" in our lives, that "suddenly" follows weeks, months, years, or even decades of "gradually." As problems develop gradually, it is easy to choose not to have


