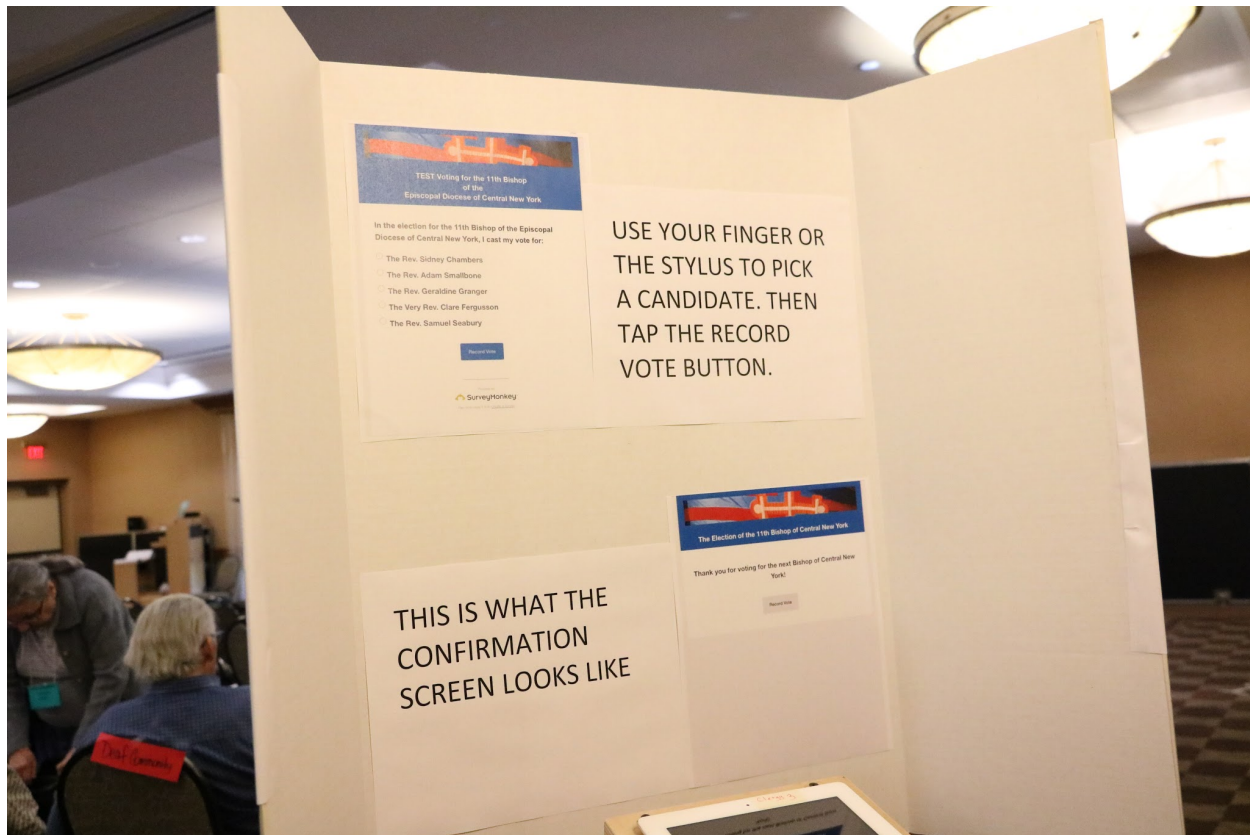
Co-chairs of the Election Art Durando and Charles Moore use the demo station for learning the voting process.

Andy Pierce cleans the screen of the iPad at a voting station before the first ballot.



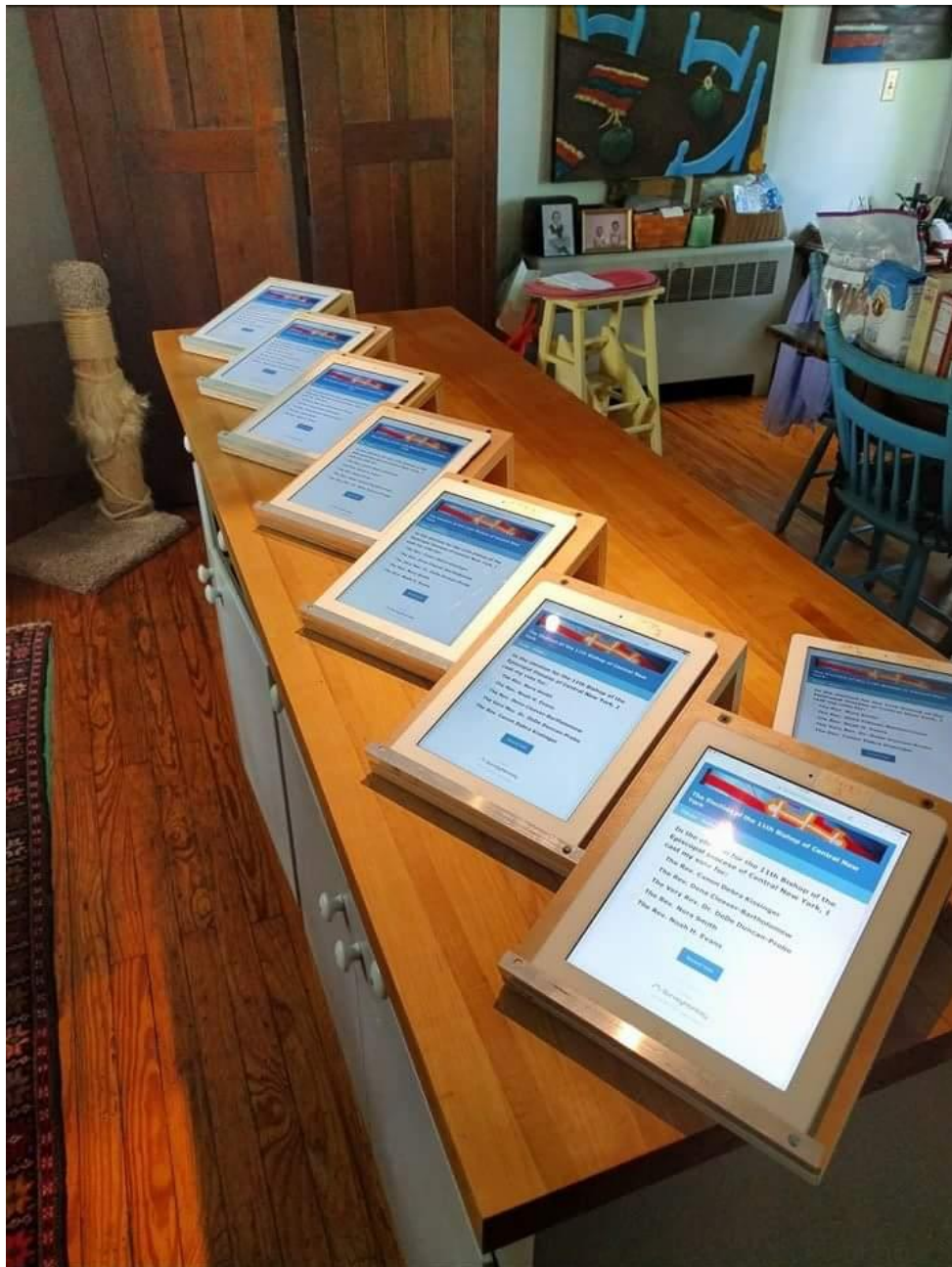
The inside of the tri-fold screen gives information about the voting process.

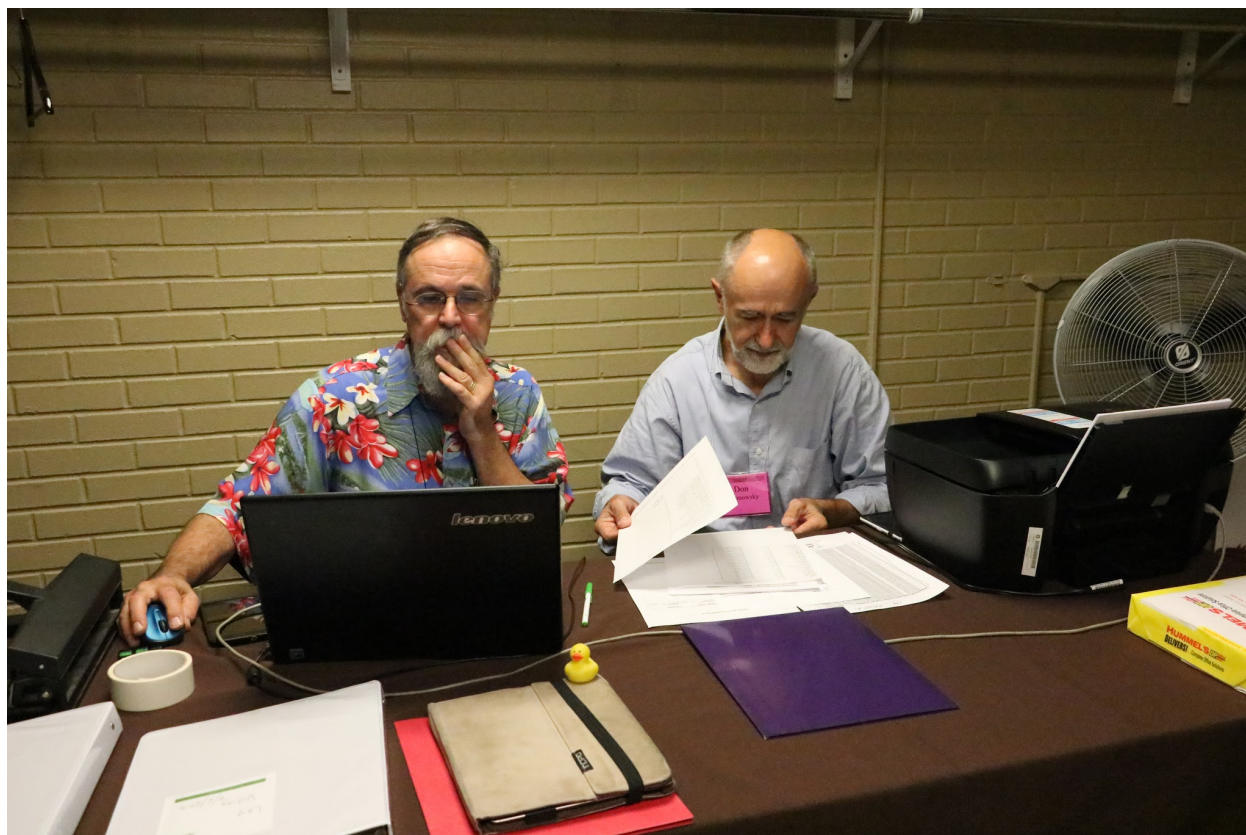
The Reverend Geoff Doolittle casts his vote for the 11th Bishop at Clergy Voting Station 1 while other voters are validated and checked in.

SThe messages to us were:

- Episcopal Communicators on Facebook is a GREAT place to get help!
- What we were doing was relatively simple, don't overthink it
- The main benefit with electronic voting is in the counting and time to provide feedback
- Ballot creation with random positions for candidates is built in and important
- Almost instant updating of the ballot as needed for candidates who withdrew
- It works for a valid and fair election!
- It is scalable to larger or smaller audiences
