THE SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

February 21, 2016

HOLY EUCHARIST

We continue our exploration of the Liturgy. Today we are looking at the part of the service where we 'respond to the Word'—through the sermon, the Creed, the prayers, the confession and the peace. Take a moment this morning to look at what you see in Church on Sunday. There are two candles on the altar to remind us that God is both human and divine. They represent Christ the light of the world coming into our lives. The ministers (clergy, lay Eucharistic ministers, and choir members) wear vestments. This is to remind us the Church belongs to no particular time or place. Other people involved in the worship (the readers, the intercessor, the ushers) do not vest in order to remind us through our baptism we are all called to minister and share in the priesthood of all believers.

We mark our time in seasons. Currently we are in Lent, a season of abstinence, a time when we strip away the stuff of our lives to make room for God. Accordingly, the vestments worn by the clergy are neutral and we don't adorn the Church with flowers or other decorations.

During the Opening Acclamation, this greeting identifies the priest who is to preside over the gathered assembly and who begins by reminding us in whose name we gather. Once gathered, the community's first act is to proclaim and respond to the Word of God.

Confession in the Eucharist is a corporate matter. The Confession is not an aggregation of individuals expressing their sorrow for their individual failures at the same time, but a body of people expressing their sorrow for the church's failure to live up to its calling. Personal confession is expressed through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is a powerful way to speak about the things for which we are sorry and hear God's message of love and forgiveness. We are encouraged to make time for this in Lent. If you are interested in making your confession, please speak to Elizabeth or Catriona.


God's mercy endures for ever.

The Lessons

The First Reading: Genesis 15:1-12,17-18

The word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, "Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great." But Abram said, "O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?" And Abram said, "You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir." But the word of the Lord came to him, "This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir." He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Then he said to him, "I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess." But he said, "O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He said to him, "Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two. And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.

When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, "To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates."

The Second Reading: Philippians 3:17-4:1

For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears. Their end is destruction; their god is the belly; and their glory is in their shame; their minds are set on earthly things. But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will transform the body of our humiliation that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

The Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

In the Prayers of the People we respond to what we have heard in the breaking open of the Word. The Book of Common Prayer prescribes that intercessory prayer be made for: the Universal Church, the world, all people according to their need and those who have died. The Prayers of the People are perhaps less about seeking to change God's mind or to direct God, and more about asking God to change us through our prayers.

The peace comes from chapter five of the Gospel of Matthew. We are to be reconciled with one another in the knowledge of God's love before receiving the Word at the table. The peace is the hinge that takes us from one part of the liturgy to the next.

We invite you to add your prayers, ending your petition with "Lord, in your mercy," to which the congregation will respond, "Hear our prayer."

Let us pray for our own needs and the needs of others.

Almighty God, as we remember in Scripture and song your great acts of love throughout the ages, renew our faith, our courage and our hope in you, and set our hearts on fire with your love, so that we may do your ministry in the world, and rejoice in the mystery of your presence in all creation. This we pray in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.





It is common practice to make the sign of the cross when the Trinity is invoked. The sign of the cross is a very ancient practice and prayer. We don't have any indication of it in Scripture, but St. Basil in the fourth century said we learned the sign from the time of the apostles and that it was administered in baptisms. It is a way of declaring Christ's presence among us and recalling what it means to be a follower of Christ.

As it is an offering, may we suggest that applause is not appropriate particularly during the season of Lent and its more subdued nature is best left without acknowledgement.

WORSHIP AT EPIPHANY

Wednesdays in Lent—The 12:10pm Eucharist during Lententide will be sung by the Schola Epiphaniensis. Short Mass settings (Kyrie, Sanctus & Agnus Dei) by Renaissance composers, Lotti, Biancheri and Hassler and plainchant propers will enhance and beautify our lunchtime liturgy during this penitential season. The addition of music will add only a few minutes to the length of the liturgy, but will give a chance for contemplation in the context of beautiful words and music.

Sundays in Lent—Join us for Instructed Eucharist at 8:00am and 11:00am during the season of Lent. We will examine the worship service's distinct parts by looking deeply at one section each week: Hearing the Word, Responding to the Word, Coming to the Table; Responding to the Table, and our Service Music as Gateway and Response to God's Love.

MUSIC AT EPIPHANY
